A note from the Pastor - July 11, 2025

"Do not fear, for I am with you, do not be afraid, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand." Isaiah 41:10

We do not always get a heads up before God calls us into an uncomfortable situation. And truth be told, it doesn't always go seamlessly as you begin, even when it is something that God has called you to. God does not promise us easy or simple paths. God promises to travel with us.

I recently read a book by Dr. Ashley Boggan, D., the General Secretary of the General Commission on Archives and History. Her book is Wesleyan Vile-tality: Reclaiming the Heart of Methodist Identity. In her book, she suggests that there is



a location that significantly impacted the development of Methodism, one that we often overlook. For those familiar with Methodist history and our founder, John Wesley, you may be aware of Oxford, Georgia, and London. In Oxford, John and his brother, Charles, developed the Holy Club. In Georgia, the Wesley brothers were missionaries who were subsequently expelled from America. London is the location of the founding of bans and the Methodist movement. But Dr. Boggan suggests that if London was the place where the Wesleys' hearts were strangely warmed, then Bristol is where his heart was set afire.

From his friend, George Whitfield, John Wesley was encouraged to preach outdoors. This may not seem radical to modern 21st-century sensibilities. However, in the 18th century, there was a strong belief that salvation could only occur within the confines of a sanctuary, and that it was a sin for a preacher to preach outside of one. Wesley had to not only be convinced. He needed to be convicted by the Holy Spirit that the world was his parish. When he was convinced and convicted, he agreed to 'submit to be more vile' and preach to the coal miners in Bristol. They had been gathering to hear the preaching of George Whitefield. When Wesley showed up instead, they pelted him. The next day, John Wesley returned to preach to the local prison. In the face of the challenge, he relied on God and continued forward with his call. Bristol became a place for Wesley to trial and test this new calling.

The prophet Isaiah reminds us that when God calls us to it, God will see us through it. Wesley took an incredible risk to follow God. There was a risk of being arrested or condemned. There was a risk of injury or defrocking in the Church of England. In the face of incredible risk, he stayed the course to follow after God, even though it was different from what he was familiar with. I do not know what God will call you to, but I do know that God continues to call. God calls God's people to use their gifts for the building up of God's kingdom and the care of God's people. If it seems untenable or even impossible, remember that God promises to go with us. In God's Love, Pastor Monica



As a result of your generosity, we are originating a grant for families seeking basic necessities at the Re-Store. Over the Lenten season, including our Cluster Lenten Service, we collected \$1,707.62 for funding. We have established a partnership with Habitat for Humanity, Family Promise, and Safe Monroe, so that all families under case management seeking necessities (beds, tables, chairs) will receive them free of cost. The purchase will be funded from the Housing Families Grant. We are working with other faith organizations to support this effort. Thank you for caring for others. SOUP KITCHEN UPDATE - JANUARY 2025

For the last year, we have seen the number of hungry people increase. Our Soup Kitchen has been feeding hungry people for decades. We also notice that often, towards the end of the month, the number of meals served increases. Many people receive their compensation at the beginning of the month. Stretching into the end of month with rent, utilities, and unforeseen expenses can be difficult. What began as a vital way to include our neighbors and affirm their dignity shifted in pandemic times to a drive-by meal and has returned to a sitdown, eat-in meal with community connections. Each week, different groups prepare and serve a meal. From the scouts to local churches, food pantries, family groups, and friends, plan a meal and serve it on Sunday from 2pm - 3pm. Sometimes, we can smell Sunday dinner from the sanctuary as we conclude the 11:00 service. I am so thankful for each of the groups that serve our neighbors. I am grateful for each one of our neighbors who has come in. In 2024, we shared over 4,300 meals with our neighbors.
